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# Where Does the Time Go?

In any profession where computers are used, the popular perception is that results will be immediate. It ain't so! If it were, I wouldn't have a job! In starting a new project, I'm often asked, "How long will it take?" When pressed for specifics, I have to admit that I don't know. The following comments may help to explain why.

▶ For a live music recording, each musician or group will have different requirements for setting up for the session. Before any music is recorded, the musicians have to decide where to sit or stand. Microphones will then be selected that are specific to their individual voices and instruments. The exact placement of the microphones is also critical. When setup is completed, music is played and basic recording levels are established. Finally, the actual recording process can begin. Each song will generally require multiple "takes" before the musicians are satisfied with their performance, but we're not finished yet. Because each voice and instrument is recorded on a separate track, the tracks must be artfully combined to achieve a proper balance. This is done by repeatedly playing back the recording while making adjustments to the controls. Once the musicians are satisfied, all of the tracks are then converted into a file type that will record on a CD. Now we have a finished recording, with a single tune requiring from thirty minutes to two hours from setup to mixdown.

▶ From a technical standpoint, recording of the spoken word by a single narrator is a fairly straightforward process. After microphone placement, and establishing a balance between recording level and earphone volume, the recording may begin. As there will always be occasional slips of the tongue, several sentences or paragraphs will need to be done more than once. Following the recording, editing will remove the "out-takes," fine-tune recording levels, add equalization where required and adjust timing and spacing. This can take longer than the original session, with a fifteen-minute script requiring as long as ninety minutes to produce a finished CD or MP3 file.

▶ Restoring a vintage record or tape can be a complex undertaking for a variety of reasons. A tape may break or not track properly; a disc recording can either skip ahead or become stuck in one revolution of the groove. A tape may suffer from low-frequency noise or high-frequency hiss, and all disc recordings include clicks and crackles of their own. A variety of techniques are used to deal with these issues, and all of them require time and skill.

▶ Whether recording music or voices, or restoring a vintage recording, there is no single button to press that will provide instant results. How long will your project take? We'll both know when it's finished!

## **Dotting I's and Crossing T's**

In our high-speed, highly technical society, documentation has become a major issue. Keeping written records of policies and procedures, tasks completed and tasks yet to be performed, is important. One reason, of course is safety concerns. Another is compliance requirements. It was interesting to narrate an online training program on documentation in a regulated and highly technical industry. The script brought home to me the importance of record-keeping – and reminded me of some improvements I could make here in the studio.

Online training programs of this kind have become increasingly popular, and provide an interesting challenge in the studio. We know that large blocks of text will be separated into smaller segments to accompany specific images. We just don't know exactly where these divisions will be made. Therefore, the narration must be done with complete silence between sentences – there can be no breathing sounds that might interfere with a cut in the video.

Although the wonders of digital technology allowed combining the four parts, the actual synchronization had to be done by ear.
